Pat was born in Sydney, one of four brothers. On leaving school he worked at the Commonwealth Bank while studying for an Economics degree at the University of New South Wales. Next he obtained a teaching diploma. He taught at several country schools in New South Wales, then moved to Canberra in 1972 to join the Commonwealth Public Service. There he worked mainly in the transport area there, retiring in the 1990s. He continued working as a contractor, with the Commonwealth and other bodies, and with associations in the transport sphere.

He was a great reader with broad tastes, but particularly in the area of transport; he enjoyed long conversations about his readings. He walked around Hackett regularly, in recent years with the aid of a stick, and knew his neighbors well. He was a well-known figure at Siam Twist. As well as being Treasurer of Hackett Neighborhood Watch he acted as Treasurer of the Transport Association for many years.

His funeral will be held at 11 am on Tuesday 10 June at the Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Watson

HACKETT PROFILE SAMARITAN HOUSE

Samaritan House has provided crisis accommodation for 30 years; it was developed by the St Vincent de Paul Society. It began as Hackett House, giving accommodation to both men and women. Now it provides accommodation for 13 homeless men as Samaritan House. Men can stay until they feel that they are ready to live back in the community. The usual length of stay for a resident is about 12 weeks. He is advised by a case-manager; food for breakfast and lunch and a cooked hot evening meal, are provided; there is a community space for socializing, and a vegetable garden. He can regain confidence in himself and his ability to maintain his independence. He is helped to find training and employment, and finally accommodation. When he leaves, he is provided at the Goodies Junction, also run by the St Vincent de Paul Society, with what he will need to set up a home. If he wishes, he can be an outreach client of Samaritan House as long as he wishes.

The House receives a small yearly grant from the Commonwealth Services Directorate, and receives support from the St Vincent de Paul Society. The men pay an accommodation fee of around \$100 per week, based on their ability to pay. The house has 2 full-time staff and 10 part-time staff. Many of the part-timers have worked there for many years; the pay is not great, but they have great satisfaction working there. The House is always staffed, night and day.

Ellizabeth Carr is the Co-ordinator of the House. She trained as a nurse in Sydney, then as a Social Worker. She worked in centres in coastal New South Wales, and has now come to Canberra to be near her son and his family. Elizabeth provides warm, understanding support to the men in her care, many of whom

have been long-term homeless and unused to consideration and support.

She is very appreciative of the strong support of the community. Elizabeth was shopping locally for food: the couple behind her in the queue asked what her staple needs were, and brought a box of such food to the House. Someone who saw what the House achieved donated a large sum for the purchase of sporting equipment. A resident lost his wallet locally; it contained a card showing where he lived, and the wallet was returned with nothing missing. An older man in the community comes frequently in the evenings to provide friendly company for the men. The men are shown respect in the local community, helping to restore their selfesteem.

The men themselves react to the kindness shown to them. Each winter homeless men come to sleep in the front lawns of the House. Residents have been known to share their clothing with these men. Samaritan House will share what it can, for instance blankets. There is a waiting list of 39 men wishing to enter Samaritan House.

It is an inspiring place.

NEED FOR A NEW TREASURER

ONLINE CRIME REPORTING.

Some years ago, ACT police introduced an online service for reporting property damage and vandalism. This was expanded to include reporting of dangerous driving. Now the service is expanded again; **retail theft** (e,g, theft of clothes or alcohol from a retail outlet) and **personal theft** (e.g. theft of tools from the tray of a vehicle or a bike theft) can be reported to ACT Policing via its website.

Following submission, a response acknowledging receipt of a report will be sent, followed by an assessment outcome within 48 hours. If a report is accepted, the assessment will include an ACT Policing reference number which can be used when contacting police in relation to an incident.

ACT Policing Chief Police Officer Scott Lee said online reporting had freed up police resources allowing officers to focus on significant and time-critical matters by handling non-urgent incidents online.
